As I write my report the water amendment bill, Restoring our Rivers, has just passed (with the support of the Greens and a number of independents) through the Federal Parliament. This will reintroduce buybacks to meet the requirements of the Murray Darling Basin Plan.

While we all support healthy and flowing creeks and rivers, we much question where this will leave our YCS. Do we keep the money promised to finish the Yanco SDLAM project or is this money taken to be used elsewhere (buybacks or other projects)? Will more water be sold out of our system? We have seen what buybacks do not only to the viability of the YCS but also to the viability of our surrounding communities.

Having read many of the published submissions to the senate inquiry, 70% were against buybacks and not one local Basin council supported buybacks as they are aware of the potential impacts.

While the willing sellers get reimbursed, and usually leave the area, the people left behind are then required to support current infrastructure, whether it be the cost of getting water delivered or trying to maintain present communities with less water. With more than 1 million ML still required to complete the Basin Plan it will have large impacts across the entire Basin and change communities for ever. Every ML removed from productive use removes somewhere between \$400 and \$2,500 from the farm gate, with much of this money going directly back into the communities.

The other question is will it fix our water quality issues (clear water), will it see the reintroduction of aquatic plants into our river channels or the removal of invasive species, such as European carp, unfortunately I don't think adding more water will address any of these issues. Speaking of clear water, if you have any stories or photos of clear water please forward to Andrea, Tanya or myself as when talking to bureaucrats they tend not to believe us when we talk about how the creek used to run clear water.

I am sure there is going to be much discussion on the new amendments moving forward, so stay tuned, get involved and any feedback will be welcomed.

Rolling Out All Resources (ROAR) Project

On a mild November morning eleven participants rolled up their sleeves, donned their gumboots and waders to plant over 300 metres of Billabong Creek frontage at Conargo TSR. Five emergent species were planted: jointed twig rush (*Baumea articulata*), river club rush (*Schoenoplectus validus*), water ribbons (*Cycnogeton procerum*), giant sedge (*Cyperus exaltatus*) and grey sedge (*Lepironia articulata*).

The instream planting event occurred as part of a Refreshing Rivers project to restore and protect Eel-tailed catfish (*Tandanus tandanus*) habitat and address key threats such as habitat degradation and water quality decline. It is also showcasing planting methods to use more broadly across the Central Billabong.

YACTAC, Murray Local Land Services, Deniliquin High School and Deni-Kolety Lagoons Landcare (DKLL) were all involved on the day. The event was made

possible due to funding from Refreshing Rivers and Program YACTAC. **Planting** would not be possible without the hard work collecting, sorting and preparing plants by Dan Hutton and guidance



Roseanne Farrant who also provided plants she grew herself.

Kids Fishing Day - Jerilderie

YACTAC and Refreshing Rivers were at the Jerilderie Fishing Club's Kids Fishing Day supporting a creative activity with a waterway theme. YACTAC commissioned Indigenous artist and Jerilderie local, Ros Lockhart, to make wood cut-outs of eel-tailed catfishes (*Tandanus tandanus*), to be painted by community on the day, and create an installation in town.

The activity aimed to promote the eel-tailed catfish, a species which once dominated the Billabong, Yanco, Colombo and Forest Creeks. Currently eel-tailed catfish are considered an Endangered Population (NSW Government's

species list). Their decline is due to a range of impacts including invasive species, habitat degradation, cold water pollution and fishing

Platypus Citizen Science Afternoon - Morundah

It is so good when platypus receive the memo about the Platy-project event and show up on cue! On Wednesday, September 27th, YACTAC as part of Refreshing Rivers Program and Murrumbidgee Landcare Inc came together with the community for an enjoyable afternoon of platypus spotting on the banks of the Colombo Creek, Morundah. Other than the magnificent platypus which emerged and dived, there were also the obligatory kangaroos and an inquisitive echidna which entertained everyone. Dr Joanne Connolly, platypus expert, shared interesting facts about this iconic species such as only males have venomous spurs, at the confluence of waterways is where platypus action is likely to occur, and there are both nesting and resting burrows used.

Organisers hope this will be an annual event. The citizen science data collected directly helps researchers fill knowledge gaps about platypuses, and the findings go to the UNSW's platypus sighting database.

Carbon, Emissions and Natural Capital 101" roadshow - Wanganella

A workshop in Wanganella helped 19 attendees (farmers/landholders/industry) begin their Carbon, Emissions and Natural Capital journey.

Presenters Cam Nicholson (Nicon Rural services agronomist) and Clare Edwards (DPI On-Farm Carbon Advice) provided an introduction on carbon farming and on-farm emissions. Carbon farming is managing land to reduce or remove carbon from the atmosphere. It can be achieved by storing carbon in the soil (sequestration) or avoiding greenhouse gases being released (emissions avoidance). Cam and Clare helped farmers understand the importance of baselining their greenhouse gas emissions, as well as see the potential for increased access to markets and productivity gains.

Andrea Mitchell, YACTAC, spoke on Refreshing Rivers and Kathleen Bartlett, MLLS, presented on Natural Capital. Natural Capital on properties are the natural assets such as the creeks, plants, animals, soil, air, plants and all living things. Landholders in the Central Billabong interested in baselining their natural capital were encouraged to sign-up for a free natural capital profile.
